Bucher Re-Named To All-Ohio Team

Mansfield Guard Selected to High School Club for Second Time.

COLUMBUS (AP) — With Massillon's undefeated and untied team in the role of pace setter, the northeastern district today dominated the annual all-state scholastic football eleven selected by the Ohio High School Coaches association.

The choices were compiled by Paul Brown, Massillon coach and president of the state association, with the aid of six district vice presidents. Brown's aids were: Doc Wargo, Akron South; Charles Cartledge, Steubenville; Robert Whittaker, Sandusky; Mike Hageley, Columbus North; Ray Tilton, Hamilton, and Ralph Ness, Lakewood.

Place Four Men.

Massillon, the possessor of a string of 20 consecutive triumphs, placed four men on the first team. Canton McKinley added two stars to give the northeastern district six representatives. Martins Ferry, another of the state's five unbeaten and untied teams, gained two places for the eastern district; and Sandusky, Toledo Waite, and Mansfield combined to give the northwestern district three places.

On the second team the eastern district placed five places; the eastern, central and northwestern, southwestern, three; the northwestern one each.

Upward of 15,000 boys played scholastic football in Ohio this fall on 137 teams. Only 14 schools, however, gained representation on the all-state squad named by the coaches.

From Massillon's great team Mike Bylene and Bob Glass were named in the backfield, and Charles Anderson, an end; and Don Snavelly, center, on the line.

—Pick Two Cantonites.

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Canton placed Don Scott at tackle, and Pete Ballos in the backfield. Johnny Bennett, a back, and Charles Jackson, an end, were selected from the Martins Ferry combine.

Other members of the first team were Charles Maag of Sandusky, tackle; and Alex Urban, Toledo Waite, and Gaylord Bucher, Mansfield, guards.

College scouts who saw the state's outstanding schoolboy elevens in action were unanimous in their praise of five members of the first team. The top-ranked youngsters were Bylene, Bennett and Glass of the backs, and Bucher and Scott, on the line.

Bylene, while an excellent ball carrier, stood out because of his exceptional passing. He was regarded as one of the finest scholastic aerial artists to be developed in the state in several seasons.

Glass was the spearhead of the Massillon attack that scored 483

points in 1935 and rolled up 441 this year. He personally accounted for 90 points during the past campaign as a result of 12 touchdowns and the conversion of 18 extra points.

Best He's Coached.

A veteran of 16 years' coaching experience, Earl Loucks of Martins Ferry, called Bennett the best scholastic back he ever saw.

Bennett is a triple threat man and an excellent defensive back. His performance in the crucial contest with Huntington, the recognized No. 1 West Virginia scholastic eleven, was typical of his season-long play.

Against Huntington Bennett gained 200 yards in 34 running attempts; was on the starting end of lateral pass plays that netted 44 yards; caught a pass good for an 11-yard gain, intercepted a pass and recovered an opponent's fumble.

Bucher was on the all-state team last season. He was a sterling defensive player and excelled at leading plays on the offense.

Russ Murphy, Mansfield coach, rates Bucher as a more brilliant college prospect than Inwood Smith, who gained All-America ranking at Ohio State.

Directed Offensive.

Scott, a 210-pound giant, directed Canton's offensive from the quarterback post and played tackle on the defense. He was a deadly blocker and tackler.

The line on the mythical team averages 185 pounds and the backfield 172.

Eight members of the team are seniors and three juniors. One of the juniors, Anderson of Massillon, however, will not be eligible for play next season because of the 20-year age limit.
